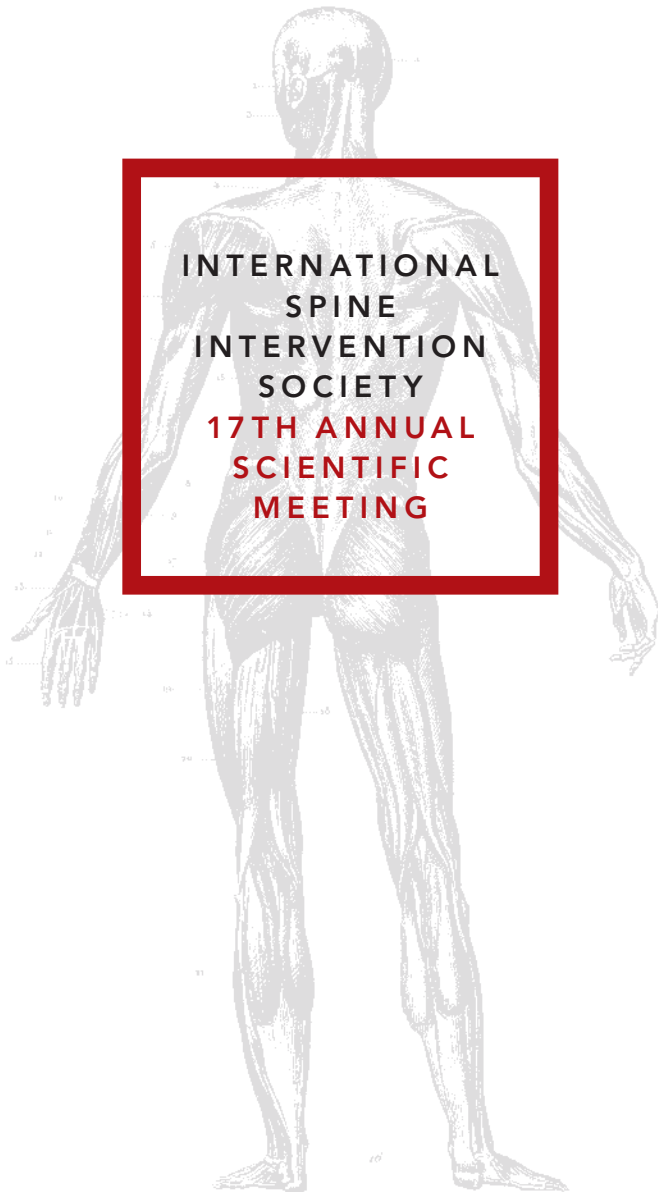

MEETING DESCRIPTION

The meetings theme *Controversies in Spine Interventions* will highlight many commonly encountered and controversial clinical scenarios including the use of blunt vs. sharp needles, one vs. two medial branch blocks pre-radiofrequency neurotomy, the indications for repeat epidural injections, the value of dorsal root ganglia lesioning, analgesic vs. provocative discography, and the use of spinal cord stimulation for axial low back pain.

Passport required to travel to Canada from the US

If driving into Canada

U.S. citizens need to present either (a) a passport, passport card (available in spring 2008), or WHTI-compliant document; or (b) a government-issued photo ID, such as a driver's license, along with proof of citizenship, such as a birth certificate.

International Attendee Required Documentation

Some International Meeting participants who live outside Canada must apply for a visa to enter Canada. The application is made to the Canadian Visa Office responsible for your area.
